## South of England Cross Country Championships Bicton College Exmouth Saturday 28th January 2006

This was the first time in the clubs 31 year history that a complete team of 12 male athletes was fielded to run in these championships.

The course at Bicton was a typically challenging cross country route consisting of 5 undulating laps covering a total of 9 miles. First home for the Harriers was Club Captain David Vosser in 164<sup>th</sup> position followed by Maz Firouzi, who is currently training hard for the London Marathon, in 234<sup>th</sup>. An injured Mike Bliss ran steadily to finish 296<sup>th</sup>, his first race since November. Lee Tolhurst in his first major cross country race for the club finished in 313<sup>th</sup> closely followed by Richard Clifford, making a welcome return from illness. The next five Harriers all finished within 2minutes of each other with Dave Bush leading the charge in 356th position, Richard Francis 383rd, Keith Clark 392<sup>nd</sup>, Martin Allen 403<sup>rd</sup>, Piers Puntan 407<sup>th</sup> and super Vet Eric Tilbury in 416<sup>th</sup>.

Steve McNair completed the Harriers team of 12 to finish 446<sup>th</sup> out of a field of nearly 600 runners.

The team narrowly missed out on winning the Hampshire cup and were beaten into second place by last years winners Stubbington Green runners who benefited by finishing 6 runners in the top 300, even though they had to wait until 480<sup>th</sup> to complete their team.

Within the Ladies Championships Nicky Clark continued to show excellent racing form finishing in 63<sup>rd</sup> with Penny Abbott struggling with a sore Achilles over the rough terrain finishing 77<sup>th</sup> out of 231 runners.

#### Hampshire Cross Country League Wimborne, Saturday February 11 from Geoff

A comfortable victory in the final Hampshire Cross Country League match at Wimborne, Saturday February 11, earned the Senior Men promotion to Division 1, as emphatic League Champions, with five wins in the five monthly outings since last October.

A clash of dates weakened the Vet's team, but the Seniors turned out in strength to the make sure of the result they needed, and were once again led home by Aaron Harris in 31st place. Aaron was followed very closely by Chris Jones, making a welcome return, in 33rd place, and Club Captain Dave Vosser 38th and 6th Vet, earning him the bronze medal in the individual Vet's League Championships. Chris Minter continued his good form in finishing 45th, and the consistent Greg England completed the senior team in 58th spot. Lee Tolhurst finished in 70th place, and Martin Crawshaw made up the Vet's team in 51st place and 126th overall. This was not enough to win the Vet's League title, but was easily enough to take the runner's up spot behind Reading AC. Geoff Cloke completed the Harrier's team in 153rd place.

In the Ladies race, Cath Wheeler ran a determined race battling with the leaders from the start, finishing 6th overall and 2nd Vet. These positions earned her a bronze in the Ladies Championships and silver in the corresponding Vets Category. Penny Abbot finished 14th with Ladies Captain Audra Dennison 17th and 9th Vet, which earned her fourth place in the Vets Championships. The Vets team was completed by Dorothy Wicke in 20th place, and Liz Sandall-Ball in 50th place, which secured the runners up spot in the Vets Ladies League Championships behind Reading Roadrunners. The Ladies finished the season fourth overall in the League.

# Winchester 10k Sunday 26th Feb 2006 from Dave Vosser

Overton Harriers collected another set of trophies to continue their successful road racing season by winning four of the age category prizes at the 24<sup>th</sup> annual Winchester 10k. Nine Harriers took part in this popular event with over 700 runners starting in the centre of the city. The quality of the field was boosted with the 2005 European Cross Country champion Hayley Yelling using the event to complete her preparations before heading off to compete in the Commonwealth Games. Club Captain David Vosser was first home in 10<sup>th</sup> spot and taking 1<sup>st</sup> place in the over 45's category. Greg England, who continues to maintain good form, followed closely in 19<sup>th</sup> place. The next three athletes all posted personal best times on a difficult course, Richard Clifford broke 39mins for the first time and was a full 2minutes quicker than his previous outing at Stubbington to finish in 34<sup>th</sup> place. Martin Allen broke his personal best by 90 seconds to finish 48<sup>th</sup> in 39min15 and is now looking to go under 39minutes at the Eastleigh 10k, Martin was followed by Nicky Clark who ran a tremendous race to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> Lady in a personal best time of 40mins05. Nicky has set her sights on breaking the 40minute barrier at Eastleigh.

A below par Richard Francis ran well to finish in 77<sup>th</sup> place followed by super Vet Eric Tilbury, who finished 1<sup>st</sup> over 60 in 42min41, Dorothy Wicke, claimed 1<sup>st</sup> Lady over 50 and Moira West 1<sup>st</sup> Lady over 55.

### RAMBLINGS FROM MAZAR by Mike McMahon

My apologies for not having put "pen to paper" for about 3 weeks, but this is the first Friday (20 Jan) that we have had the opportunity to pause for breath, and have a down day, since the New Year. So, working on the great military assumption of not knowing when having the next five minutes to oneself will occur again, I thought that I would compile another few ramblings from Mazar.

I suppose the highlight, if one wishes to use that word, of my travel since the beginning of the year, has been the recent 9 hour journey by road through the Hindu Kush and Salang Tunnel, to Kabul for a two day conference that was postponed whilst I was en route. So what's the fuss, I hear you say. Well, the fact that the journey was done in the worst weather to hit the central and northern regions of the country this year, creating 2 metre high snow drifts in the Pass, with the road looking like a vehicle scrap yard for most of the journey, would be my answer to that question. The fact that mobile phone coverage is also non existent in many of the rural areas did not help, nor did the fact that the organizers chose to postpone the event late in the morning of the vary day that most people would be starting their travels. Anyway, the journey was a fascinating experience, not to be repeated if you are of a nervous disposition, and the Salang Tunnel and the Kush are both amazing to see in any weather. The Tunnel itself is, at 11,030 feet above sea level, claimed by the Afghans to be the highest road tunnel in the world. It was built by the Russians in 1965 and proved to be an extremely convenient route for Soviet tanks during their occupation of Afghanistan in 1979. Until this tunnel was built, northern Afghanistan was effectively isolated from the south during the winter when the other passes froze. That is why you will find even better snow and ice clearing equipment in the Pass than that used by most local councils in UK.

Having managed not to get stranded in Kabul for too long; far too many military rules, regulations and petty bureaucracy for my independently-minded approach (!), my next excursion was to the main border crossing point with Uzbekistan. Hayratin Town is about 2 hours drive north of Mazar and is on the River Oxus which marks the border. The Friendship Bridge (800 metres long) provides the only reliable road and rail link between the two countries. The Bridge was built by the Soviet Union (hence its name) and, like the Salang Tunnel, proved to be very useful in 1979! This relatively small town provides a microcosm of Afghanistan's security bureaucracy; a total of no less than 7 different official police and customs organizations control the town, the border crossing itself and the immediate local area. It was a very pleasant surprise to see, albeit on the surface, that despite the confusion, they do actually manage to maintain pretty good security. However, there are more vehicle check points on the last two mile stretch of the main road leading to the crossing, each operated by a different official department, to ensure that each gets their cut of the pie so to speak.

After the sad loss of a British soldier in late October last year, followed by a suicide bomber blowing himself up in the grounds of the Blue Mosque in Mazar, our presence actually in the Mosque's grounds has been non-existent. Nevertheless, the mullahs and the officials associated with the Mosque are really important and influential members of the community. They can reach far more people than any information campaign which we might organize. Having made the decision to visit the Mosque's leaders and re-establish the links in this potentially difficult area, I made arrangements to meet with one of the deputy leaders of the Mosque today (Friday 20 Jan). I chose a Friday as the Mosque and surrounding area would be busy and therefore reducing the likelihood of any attack against us. From the second that we arrived in just two civilian-type vehicles, we all felt at ease and not threatened in any way by the locals; if anything, they were, as usual very welcoming if a little curious. We walked freely around this beautiful Mosque, obviously not entering the actual shrine and I, and my small group of soldiers, were very well entertained by the deputy leader.

The Shrine of Ali, located in the Blue Mosque compound, has a curious history. Ali, the Prophet's son-in-law, is reputed to be buried here after his assassination in AD 661. One other site vies with Mazar for the honour, nearer to the actual place of death in Kufa, Iraq. The Mazari's story is that Ali's companions placed his body on the back of a white she-camel which wandered until she fell, exhausted on the spot where the shrine is and where his body is now buried. All knowledge of the final resting place was lost until the beginning of the 12<sup>th</sup> century, when its existence was revealed in a dream to a mullah. The shrine was originally built in 1136. Genghis Khan destroyed the building, having heard stories of the great treasures buried under its pillars. Once again the grave lay unmarked until a second revelation occurred and the current buildings were constructed in 1481. None of the 15<sup>th</sup> century decoration remains, but the modern restoration replicates the decoration used over 500 years ago. The tiles are individual squares that have been handpainted and dazzle in bright sunlight. It is a truly spectacular place and one in which you really feel a sense of calm.

Well, my weekly down time is rapidly coming to end, so I will stop rambling now; yippee I hear you cheer! Tomorrow (Sat 21 Jan) I am off to address a local Shura (council) deep in the Sholgara Valley south of Mazar; another relatively unknown, but difficult area for our teams to operate in. On Sunday 22 Jan I am off to prison so to speak, but only as a visitor to the local "nick"; then a session with the Mayor of Mazar (another appointee who says a lot but does very little to improve the locals' quality of life) and finally, a live recording on Radio Balkh. Busy and at times frustrating as life is here in Afghanistan, it sure beats commuting to work in central London!



## Training Weekend 10th to 13th February from Frank Kenny

Every year we arrange a trip to the West Country that by all accounts should be cold, bleak and thoroughly miserable. Overnight, disturbances were heard in Sycamore when our venerable (I think that's the word) President, who got out of bed to make sure his kidneys were still working, was challenged very loudly with "OI!!! WHAT DO YOU THINK YOU'RE DOING"!! from our resident Saints supporter. When JT told him what was happening ET apologised very sheepishly. For me, at 02:08, this had a surreal quality, where you don't know if you are dreaming or everyone else is.

Saturday morning there was a reprise of the discussion before the reps started but eventually it was agreed and the session got under way with John and Ian doing a sterling job in marshalling us up and down the path. And Nicky, the longest rep was only two minutes, not three.

Saturday afternoon was free for everyone and some chose to stay locally, some chose to walk (the distances were elongated as the weekend wore on) and some went much further afield. Chris and I chose the Eden Project nr St Austell, which was excellent. A late run on the Saturday was well attended and the evening meal was a joyful affair as several of the runners returned from the final Hampshire Cross Country league meeting with a hatful of team and individual trophies. Well done to all concerned.

Overnight rain didn't spoil the Sunday run and compared to last year most runners were able to go "heads up" along the coast path that had been so treacherous 12 months ago.

Confusion was rife, again in Sycamore when our elder statesmen appeared were wearing the same shirt. (No! the same style of shirt, not the SAME shirt) there was some under the breath mutterings from both long the lines of "Oi,!! What do you think you are doing"?

Lunch at the Falcon hotel was just delightful and it is clear to see why the club is so successful. It really is a community club with an age range approaching 70 years. I'm sure there are not many activities that could bring this age range together, especially in the harmony and enjoyment that was so obvious. The children were playing happily, the grown ups were relaxed and chatting and the whole atmosphere was just sublime.

Well done again to Nicky & Keith, Dave and Madeleine for making all the arrangements. Hopefully, the facilities will still be available to us next year but there is some doubt on the catering.
